# World Championship Points System for Singles

## **Qualifying Tournaments**

The World Championships Points System for Singles allows players to gain points in tournaments classified as Qualifying Tournaments (QTs). These events are tiered either 1 or 2; Tier 1 carrying double the weighting of Tier 2. The total number of points available in a particular tournament is be dictated by its weighting and the quality of the draw.

The current QTs are listed below:

- British Open (Tier 1 in every season)
- US Open (Tier 1 in every season)
- Western Open (Tier 2 in every season)
- Manchester Gold Racquet (Tier 2 in every other season starting 2021/22)
- UK Invitation (Tier 2 in every other season starting 2022/23)

Any player regardless of his status (amateur or professional) is able to compete in a maximum of four QTs during the course of a season.

### Scoring points

It is only possible to win ranking points if a player progresses to the quarter-finals or better of a QT.

The method for establishing the number of points available for a particular tournament will run as follows:

Rating of the event (Tier 1 tournaments will be rated double; Tier 2 as single).

The <u>Quality of the Field</u> is dependent on how many players in the top 12 of the Elite Rackets World Rankings enter the draw. The World Number 1 generates 12 points to the tournament, the number 2 generates 11, through to the number 12 contributing 1 point. A maximum of 78 points is available in any event (subject to the entry of every player in the top 12). This figure is divided by a constant denominator (16).

The <u>Weighting</u> of a QT is determined using the two variables above to produce a Y factor for the tournament. The following algorithm will be used:

Y = Quality of Field (range 0-78) multiplied by the tier value (1 or 2), divided by a 16.

The distribution of points after the completion of each QT is calculated as below:

Winner of the tournament 10 x Y Runner-up 6 x Y Losing semi-finalists 3 x Y Losing quarter-finalists 1 x Y

#### Effective for 2021/22 season onwards

If the entire top 12 play in an Open Singles, the Y factor is  $(78 \times 2)/16 = 9.75$ 

Winner receives  $9.75 \times 10 = 97.5$  World Championship (WC) Points Finalist receives  $9.75 \times 6 = 58.50$  WC Points Semi-finalists receive  $9.75 \times 3 = 29.35$  WC Points Quarter-finalists receives  $9.75 \times 1 = 9.75$  WC Points

A QT which attracts none of the top 12 players would have no WC points awarded.

No points are awarded to participants in any World Championship Eliminator or Challenge Match.

#### **Points Lists**

Points gained by a player in a QT count towards his standing on two separate lists.

The <u>Elite World Singles Rankings</u>. This will operate on a 36-month<sup>1</sup> rolling basis and with a sliding scale for points value. Points from the current twelve-month period count triple, points from 12-24 months previously count double and points from 24-36 months previous count singly. Points have no value after three years have elapsed.

The <u>World Championship Challenge Points</u>. This reflects how the players stand in the race to qualify for the next Eliminator and/or Challenge Match. This will operate over a two-year Qualifying Period (QP) in the lead up to the next scheduled World Championship Singles Challenge Match. The World Championship Challenge Points reflect the aggregate points scored by a player in QTs during the current QP.

World Championship Challenge Points are reset to zero at the conclusion of each QP.
